Last week, the district participated in **No-Name Calling Week** (**NNCW**), an event organized by K-12 educators and students to end name-calling and bullying in schools. Scholars at Dr. Charles C. Polk School celebrated NNCW by focusing on the theme of "Call Me by My Name." Students decorated tags with names they like to be called, positive attributes about themselves as well as their pronouns.

"It was important that students share these name tags in class to promote respect, individuality and inclusivity," said Principal Andreea Harry.

Students also created biography poems that included positive traits about themselves, things they like, their greatest fears as well as who or what means the most to them.

"Through this activity, scholars were able to identify and discuss

Accountable (Self-Management)


Responsible Decisions (Responsible Decision Making)
